






<p>CHEWED LEAF An insect, possibly beetle or caterpillar has eaten the leaf. The leaf is food!</p> 	<p>BARK Like our skin, bark protects plants from disease entry, heat and cold. It is also a shelter for many animals.</p>
<p>BUDS The beginnings of a flower (an unopened flower).</p> 	<p>GUM NUT OR EUCALYPT FRUIT Woody capsules or fruit that contain seeds of Eucalyptus trees</p> 
<p>A FLOWER Flowers are part of the life cycle of most plants and necessary for seed to be formed.</p> 	<p>OTHER FRUIT Other types of fruit include pods, berries and cones. All contain seeds of the plant.</p>
<p>CURLED LEAF These leaves may have been damaged by an insect and/or used as a shelter by an insect or spider.</p>	<p>GRASS SEED HEAD Grasses are flowering plants and part of the bush understorey. They grow in tussocks and provide food and shelter.</p> 
<p>A FEATHER All birds have feathers. Birds need trees, shrubs and groundcovers for shelter, food and nesting.</p>	<p>LEAF WITH GALLS Galls are funny growths that look like pimples or lumps on a leaf. They are mostly caused by insects.</p>
<p>FEATHERY LEAF A leaf which is divided into smaller bits or leaflets – they can look ferny or feathery.</p> 	<p>DEAD INSECT There are over 86,000 insects in Australia. A greater variety of insects are found in bushland than in crops, pasture and home gardens.</p>
